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The Nevada Health Workforce Research Center and Nevada Area Health Education Centers (AHEC) Program based at the University of Nevada, Reno School of Medicine are pleased to present the seventh edition of Health Care Careers in Nevada. Over the past decade, more than forty thousand copies of the guide have been distributed to students, parents, and educators in every school district in Nevada.

The 2024-2025 edition of Health Care Careers in Nevada contains information on over 80 health care occupations, including a job overview, employment outlook, and average salary for each occupation. The guide also provides an inventory of available educational certificates, degree programs, and state boards and agencies responsible for licensing health professionals in Nevada.

Health Care Careers in Nevada is primarily targeted to middle school and high school students interested in exploring careers in medicine, nursing, oral health, pharmacy, and other health care fields. The guide is also valuable for college students, parents of school-aged children, and anyone interested in learning about health care educational opportunities available in Nevada.

Currently, 167,032 Nevadans are employed in the health care industry which includes ambulatory care services, hospitals, nursing and residential care facilities. These businesses employ a wide-range of clinical and non-clinical jobs, comprising 10.2% of the total workforce. Twenty of the 100 fastest growing occupations in Nevada are in health care.

Between 2020 and 2030, the health care sector in Nevada is projected to add 37,611 jobs – an increase of 28.1%. Over the next decade, job growth in the health sector is expected to exceed the rate for the entire economy of Nevada (19.5%).

In conclusion, health care jobs in Nevada continue to represent well-paying, recessionresistant employment for thousands of young Nevadans poised to enter the state's workforce over the next decade. Many of these opportunities will increase as a result of the growing demand for health care associated with population growth, an improving economy, and retirees relocating to the Silver State. New health care workers will also be needed to replace retirees from an aging health workforce.

Our hope is that the latest edition of the Health Care Careers in Nevada can assist anyone interested in exploring the wide range of employment opportunities in health care over the next decade.

Overview

Medical Doctors (MDs) and Doctors of Osteopathic Medicine (DOs), are commonly referred to as physicians or doctors. They are highly trained healthcare professionals who diagnose, treat, and prevent various medical conditions and diseases. MDs practice allopathic medicine, also called mainstream or Western medicine. MDs manage and treat symptoms and diseases using drugs, radiation, and surgery. DOs use a combination of traditional medical practices and osteopathic manipulative treatment, a hands-on technique, to help patients improve or maintain their health. DOs focus on the body's musculoskeletal system, preventive medicine, and holistic patient care. MDs and DOs work in various medical specialties, including primary care, surgery, and behavioral health.

Physicians are responsible for providing medical care to patients. They examine patients, take medical histories, order and interpret diagnostic tests, and develop treatment plans. They also promote preventive medicine by talking with patients about healthy lifestyles and disease prevention through vaccinations, screening, and behavior change. A physician may refer patients to other specialists or practitioners. They coordinate care for their patients with nurses, social workers, rehabilitation therapists, pharmacists, psychologists, and other health care providers.

Physicians undergo extensive education and training. Education and training after high school takes from 11 to 15 years. Physicians start with a four-year bachelor's degree, four years of medical school, and three to seven years of residency training after receiving their MD or DO degree. Many physicians chose to specialize in areas such as cardiology, surgery, pediatrics, or internal medicine. Medicine is a constantly evolving field. To update their skills, physicians must take continuing medical education courses in order to maintain a practicing license and provide the best care to their patients. Physicians may work in hospitals as part of a team coordinating care of patients. They also practice in private offices or clinics. In a hospital, physicians share the responsibility for treating the patient with nurses, medical assistants, therapists, technicians, technologists, and other health professionals. Physicians also work in research, academia, or with health maintenance organizations, pharmaceutical companies, medical device manufacturers, health insurance companies, or in corporations directing health and safety programs.

Overview

Family medicine physicians provide comprehensive preventive care to individuals across the lifespan by being the patient's first contact for any health concerns. Family medicine physicians conduct routine checkups, health risk assessments, immunizations, screening tests, lifestyle counseling, and much more. They also treat chronic diseases, such as diabetes, high blood pressure, and heart disease.

Family medicine physicians track their patient's medical history, reports, and examination results. They advise patients about diet, physical activity, and disease prevention. To diagnose a patient's condition, they may order, perform, and interpret diagnostic tests. Family medicine physicians monitor patients' conditions and progress, and reevaluate treatments as necessary. They explain procedures, discuss test results, and prescribe treatments. They often refer patients to medical specialists or other practitioners when necessary and coordinate additional care with specialists and other health care providers.

Family medicine physicians primarily work in private offices or clinics. They increasingly work with a team of health professionals including nurses, medical assistants, and other support staff.

Advances in medicine require family medicine physicians to update their skills regularly by taking continuing medical education courses. Major areas of specialization within family medicine include geriatric medicine and sports medicine.

MEDICAL ASSISTANT

Overview

Medical assistants (MAs) support physicians, registered nurses, and other medical staff by performing administrative and clinical duties. They carry out routine treatments, conduct lab tests, and maintain office records. Medical assistants take medical histories and record a patient's weight, pulse rate, blood pressure, and other vital signs. With additional training, some MAs draw blood or take x-rays. They explain treatments to patients and prepare them for the rest of their medical examination or appointment.

Medical assistants follow directions from physicians. They also help the doctor during patient examinations by handing the doctor materials and preparing medications. They collect and prepare laboratory specimens, perform basic lab tests, and instruct patients about medication and special diets. MAs record EKGs, change bandages, remove stitches, or administer medications. After a patient has been seen, medical assistants clean and prepare the room for the next patient.

Medical assistants also have clerical duties. They answer telephones, greet patients, escort them to exam rooms, and update medical records. They fill out insurance forms, schedule appointments, and assist patients with hospital admission and lab services. Although certification and additional training are available, only a high school diploma is needed to begin working. Many health professionals begin their career as a medical assistant. Increasingly, health care employers are offering paid apprenticeships for students training to become medical assistants.

Overview

An obstetrician/gynecologist (OB/GYN) is a physician who treats women before, during, and after childbirth. The obstetrician/gynecologist definition is really a combination of two types of medicine. Obstetrics focus on pregnancy and related matters. Gynecologists focus on the medical needs of women in general. Some perform medical and gynecological surgery, such as cesarean sections or hysterectomies.

They work in many different settings, including inside of offices, hospital inpatient care, large group practices, as academic faculty, or in obstetric surgery. To become an obstetrician/gynecologist, one must be a physician who has completed education and training in the management of pregnancy, labor, the post-partum period, and the female reproductive system.

Obstetricians/Gynecologists are knowledgeable about the female reproductive system, pregnancy, childbirth, preventative care, detection of sexually transmitted diseases, and oncology. They diagnose, treat, and help prevent health issues that only affect women. Advances in medicine require obstetricians/gynecologists to update their skills regularly by taking continuing medical education courses. Major areas of specialization in obstetrics/gynecology include gynecologic oncology, female pelvic medicine and reconstructive surgery, and maternal and fetal medicine.

Overview

Pediatricians are doctors who care for children from birth to young adulthood, focusing on their physical, emotional, and social health. They examine children's growth and development. They are responsible for diagnosing diseases and injuries, and prescribing treatments, therapy, medications, and vaccinations.

Pediatricians collect, record, and maintain health information from children and their families, such as medical history, reports, and examination results. They monitor children's conditions, progress, and reevaluate treatments as necessary. Pediatricians advise parents or guardians on diet, activity, hygiene, and disease prevention. They explain procedures, discuss test results, and prescribe treatments. A pediatrician may refer children to medical specialists or other practitioners when necessary. They will also coordinate work with nurses, social workers, rehabilitation therapists, pharmacists, psychologists, and other health care providers.

Pediatricians work in many different settings. Pediatricians often work in patient care as part of a team coordinating care for a population of patients or in private offices or clinics. In a hospital, pediatricians and pediatric specialists share the responsibility for treating their young patients alongside nurses, medical assistants, therapists, technicians, technologists, and other health professionals.

Pediatricians are constantly updating their skills to provide their patients with the best care and to keep up with advances in pediatric medicine. Pediatricians increasingly complete fellowships to become specialists, such as pediatric cardiologists and pediatric oncologists.

Overview

Physician assistants (PAs) practice medicine and are trained to make clinical decisions, and provide a broad range of diagnostic, therapeutic, preventative, and health maintenance services. PAs diagnose, provide treatment for common illnesses, and prescribe medicine under a physician's supervision. The working relationship between a PA and a doctor is fundamental to the profession and enhances the quality of care given to their patients. The practice of PAs focuses on patient care and may include educational, research, and administrative activities.

Physician assistants' work includes providing primary and specialty care in medical and surgical practice settings. Many PAs work in primary care areas, such as family medicine and pediatrics. Others work in specialty areas, such as surgery, emergency medicine, and geriatrics. Duties vary with the specialty. For example, some PAs work as an assistant to doctors in surgery. Other PAs manage doctors' offices and supervise technicians and other assistants. In areas where doctors are in short supply, PAs may be the only providers of health care. In all settings they are required to consult with physicians.

Other duties involve basic diagnostic care, such as interviewing patients, performing physical exams, and ordering lab tests. There are more complex tasks assigned to the PA, such as setting simple fractures, giving shots, and running electrocardiograms (EKG). Their training includes dealing with many medical emergencies. PAs develop health care plans for patients. They record patients' health history, progress, and test results. They also counsel patients about medications and teach them healthy living techniques.

Overview

Surgeons are physicians who diagnose and treat conditions, injuries, or illnesses that require surgery. They operate on patients for a variety of reasons, such as orthopedic injuries or to treat cancer. Surgeons first diagnose patients and develop treatment plans. During an operation, they perform procedures and lead a team to ensure that everything goes smoothly. After an operation, surgeons are responsible for monitoring their patient's care and recovery. There are many surgical specialties, including obstetrics and gynecology, orthopedics, vascular, neurology, and oncology.

Obstetric and gynecological surgeons are trained to operate on pregnant women and treat female reproductive systems. An obstetrician may operate to deliver babies with cesarean delivery (c-sections) when the mother is at risk of complications during labor. A gynecological surgeon uses surgery to treat diseases related to the female pelvic region. They preform operations to treat endometriosis, ovarian and fibroid cysts, uterine prolapse, and abnormal bleeding.

Orthopedic surgeons specialize in treating diseases and musculoskeletal conditions. They operate on bones, joints, ligaments, tendons, muscles, and associated nerves. Some specialize in specific areas of the body, like feet or spines. Neurosurgeons specifically operate on the brain and nervous system to treat disorders and illnesses. Vascular surgeons treat patients with diseases that affect veins and arteries throughout the body, except the brain and heart. Surgical oncologists use surgery to make a diagnosis, determine the stage of cancer, and remove tumors and surrounding tissues.

SURGICAL TECHNOLOGIST

Overview

Surgical technologists prepare and assist with surgical procedures. They work under the supervision of surgeons and nurses and assist during surgery. They help with tissue retraction, insertion of tubes and intravenous lines, or closure of surgical wounds. They often perform preoperative and postoperative duties to facilitate patient care. The surgical environment and operating room are very controlled, with surgical instruments and supplies set up in a pre-arranged order. Everything must be kept sterile.

Surgical technologists assist in preparing patients for surgery. Before surgery, surgical technologists help set up the operating room. They wash and sterilize instruments, linens, and solutions. They set up, adjust, and check equipment to be sure it works properly. They prepare patients for surgery by transporting them to the operating room, positioning them on the table, and covering them with surgical "drapes." They also observe the patient's vital signs. In addition, surgical technologists help the surgical team scrub into surgery by helping them put on gloves, gowns, and masks.

During surgery, technologists pass instruments and supplies to surgeons and the surgical team. They hold retractors (instruments that hold back the edges of a wound) or cut sutures (stitches). They maintain supplies of fluid, such as blood or saline. Technologists operate other equipment, such as lights or suction machines. They also help apply dressings to a patient's incisions. In addition, they count sponges, needles, and instruments when the procedure is complete. Technologists prepare and care for specimens taken for lab analysis. After surgery, technologists transfer patients to the recovery room. Then they clean and restock the operating room for the next procedure. Increasingly, health care employers, such as hospitals and physician offices, are offering paid apprenticeships for students training to become surgical technologists.

Overview

Certified nurse midwives (CNMs) are advanced practice registered nurses, who provide counseling and medical care during pregnancy and childbirth, as well as prenatal and post-partum patient care. Most certified nurse midwives work closely with the expectant mother and her family before the baby is born. They educate pregnant women about proper nutrition, exercise, and general well-being. Certified nurse midwives also help pregnant women plan for childbirth. This includes helping women determine how they will manage pain.

In general, midwives perform very few technological interventions during delivery. This means that certain surgical procedures and pain medications are referred to physicians. Certified nurse midwives typically work with women with "low-risk" pregnancies. If complications occur, midwives direct their patients to physicians.

Many people mistakenly think that certified nurse midwives only assist with births, this is only a fraction of midwives' duties. They spend a small portion of their time in the direct care of birthing women and their newborns. Certified nurse midwives help mothers recover after delivery and help new mothers and babies learn how to breast feed. Midwives also provide routine gynecological services and care, including reproductive health visits.

Overview

Certified nursing assistants (CNAs) give personal care to patients in hospitals and nursing homes. They work under the direction of licensed nurses and doctors. For many patients, nursing assistants are the people they see most often on a daily basis. By helping patients with activities of daily living, nursing assistants help them achieve a better quality of life and provide them comfort.

Certified nursing assistants check with the supervising nurse for instructions about each patient. They explain some medical instructions to patients and family members. Nursing assistants also prepare food trays, deliver meals, and clean rooms for their patients.

Certified nursing assistants set up and monitor equipment. They record vital signs such as blood pressure, temperature, pulse, and respiration. They move patients in wheelchairs or beds to exam or operating rooms. CNAs sterilize equipment and supplies. They prepare and stock dressings and treatment trays. CNAs watch for changes in patients' mental alertness or emotions. If changes are observed, nursing assistants notify the supervising nurse. Some nursing assistants also perform clerical duties, such as filing and making appointments.

Certified nursing assistants work in nearly all departments of a hospital and nursing homes. Many people who become CNAs gain work experience and learn more about the medical industry and go on to pursue other careers in health care. Starting as a CNA requires a certification and a high school diploma. There is a growing number of high schools and hospitals in Nevada counties offering classes and programs to become certified.

Overview

Certified registered nurse anesthetists (CRNAs) are nurses trained to administer anesthesia to patients before surgery. Certified registered nurse anesthetists are advanced practice registered nurses who have completed additional specialized training to administer anesthesia.

CRNAs care for and monitor patients before, during, and after a surgical procedure. Under anesthesia, people need to be closely monitored as everyone reacts differently to anesthesia. The person administering the anesthesia makes sure the patient's breathing, temperature, heartbeat, and fluid levels are where they should be. Nurse anesthetists meet with patients to obtain and review medical histories. This helps them develop anesthesia care plans and prepare the patient for surgery.

During surgical procedures, nurse anesthetists manage the breathing of patients using a variety of medical techniques and equipment. They examine a patient's skin color, pulse, blood pressure, and respiration to make sure the patient is doing well. In some situations, an emergency may arise and nurse anesthetists must act fast. They have to open patient airways and administer fluids and necessary drugs very quickly. After the procedure is completed, the nurse anesthetist monitors the patient's recovery. They administer drugs or medicines to lessen any ill effects, such as nausea.

Certified registered nurse anesthetists work in a variety of settings, including hospitals, outpatient surgery centers, and plastic surgery centers. Many CRNAs work in rural health care settings due to the difficulty in recruiting anesthesiologists to practice in rural communities.

Licensed practical nurses (LPNs) care for people who are sick, injured, or have disabilities. Most LPNs provide basic bedside care to patients, such as obtaining vital signs, administering treatments, collecting assessment data, assisting in developing care plans, and providing patient education. LPNs provide patient care based on physician orders and can start intravenous fluids. LPNs work under the supervision of a doctor or registered nurse.

Licensed practical nurses work in a variety of settings, such as hospitals, skilled nursing facilities, nursing homes, outpatient centers, doctors' offices, clinics, and home health care. Experienced licensed practical nurses supervise nursing assistants and aides.

Overview

Nurse practitioners (NPs) are registered nurses who have taken additional training and have a master's in nursing. NPs are also considered advanced practice registered nurses (APRNs). They are licensed to diagnose disease or injuries and prescribe treatments and medications according to the top of their training.

NPs have knowledge and skills to work one-on-one with a patient. In Nevada, it is common for nurse practitioners to work independently as primary care clinicians seeing patients for a variety of issues, as well as for general check-ups and exams. Overview

Registered nurses (RNs) care for patients who are ill or injured in a wide-range of clinical settings. They work to promote health and help patients cope with illness. RNs work with patients in hospitals, nursing homes, and clinics. They also work in a variety of public settings, such as local health departments, schools, and government agencies.

In the hospital, RNs observe patients and carry out medical treatments. They use computerized equipment to monitor patients' vital signs, record observations and medical data in patient charts. RNs work to promote safety and health, and to prevent additional health problems, such as infections. RNs prepare patients for exams and check vital signs. They help doctors with patient exams, draw blood, and give injections. Office nurses also perform routine lab tests and administrative tasks. In long term care facilities, such as nursing homes, RNs manage the health care of residents and supervise licensed practical nurses (LPNs) and nursing assistants. Home health nurses and private duty nurses provide prescribed nursing care to patients in their own homes. They also instruct patients and their families how to assist with care.

Public health and community RNs work to improve the overall health of communities. They provide health care and first aid. They administer vaccines and provide health screenings, such as blood pressure and cholesterol screening. Public health nurses develop health education programs to teach the public about topics like nutrition and wellness. In addition, they refer patients to community agencies and service providers.

Overview

Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) are first responders who give medical care in emergencies. They are trained to quickly assess a patient and determine the extent of injury or illness when called to provide medical assistance. EMTs can use their training and specialized tools to help patients recover at one location or stabilize and prepare them for transport to a medical facility. They also call ahead to alert medical staff at the medical center. Upon arrival, they report the patient's status to medical staff and record any treatment administered in the patient's chart.

Having medical experience is not necessary to start as an EMT. However, EMTs receive in-depth training to respond to emergencies and provide basic life support. The most important skill is to assess a patient and determine if their injury or illness is life-threatening.

When not responding to emergencies, EMTs can do other work. They often transport patients to different medical facilities. Some even attend large events, like Burning Man and music festivals, to provide first aid. Some visit patients at home for basic or preventative care. EMTs are also in charge of replacing supplies, checking equipment, and decontaminating the ambulance. Some high schools provide EMT courses and programs.

With additional training, EMTs can become certified as an Advanced Emergency Medical Technician (AEMT) and potentially Paramedics. Having more training and higher certifications gives EMTs more responsibilities and skills that they can use to care for people in critical need. EMTs at all levels are lifelong learners and constantly update their skills by attending annual trainings.

Overview

Paramedics respond to emergencies and have additional training to provide advanced life support. Sometimes, they can help patients on the scene without taking them to a hospital. In other cases, they must quickly stabilize patients and keep them alive until they reach a medical facility. While transporting patients, Paramedics communicate with doctors and nurses about their patient's condition and care. They record the treatments given to patients to ease the transition from being in an ambulance to a medical facility.

Paramedics perform advanced life support and have specialized equipment to stabilize their patients. They can perform tracheotomies, set up IVs, and administer medications. Paramedics' additional training allows them to lead other emergency medical responders on their team.

Paramedics are constantly learning and updating their skills with annual training. They maintain, sanitize, and restock their equipment when not responding to emergencies. Some are "Community Paramedics," where they visit patients at home for basic or preventative care, such as flu shots and blood sugar monitoring.

Becoming a paramedic takes about a year of training. Additional training allows them to work in interesting and diverse settings. Some paramedics work for ski resorts, special response teams at police departments, and on life support or medical helicopters.

Applied behavior analysts help people of all ages improve their lives and functioning by designing and implementing treatment plans to change problematic or challenging behaviors. They work with their patients to understand what triggers certain behaviors and find ways to change that behavior. They work in schools, clinics, large organizations, communities, and homes. Behavior analysts commonly work with people who have learning or developmental disorders, including individuals with a diagnosis on the autism spectrum.

There are three levels of certification/licensure for behavioral analysists in Nevada: registered behavior technicians, licensed assistant behavior analysts, and licensed behavior analysts. Each requires different levels of education and training. All behavior analysts work as part of a larger team. Many individuals progress to more advanced levels, supervise, and work more independently as they gain experience and education.

Anyone with a high school diploma can become a registered behavior technician. Registered behavior technicians work directly with patients to help them improve their social interactions, communication, and problem-solving skills by implementing a care plan under their supervisor's direction.

Licensed assistant behavior analysts have a bachelor's degree. They are trained in writing, implementing, assessing, and evaluating treatment plans under their supervisor's direction.

A licensed behavior analyst works independently and can supervise licensed assistant behavior analysts and registered behavior technicians. They must have a master's degree or a doctorate. They create treatment plans to help analyze and modify problematic behavior based on behavioral and environmental triggers.

Mental health counselors help people overcome personal challenges, meet goals, and focus on their mental and emotional health. They help people understand themselves on a deeper level, and find solutions and strategies to overcome personal challenges.

Mental health counselors build positive and supportive relationships with their patients. This helps counselors identify problems, work through challenges and difficulties, and teach their patients healthy ways to cope with and solve problems.

Mental health counselors work with individuals, families, couples, and groups. Some counselors work with specific groups, like older adults, children, or people who have experienced trauma or abuse. They often help patients during times of crisis. Mental health counselors provide treatment in various settings, including hospitals, treatment centers, private practice, community-based behavioral health agencies, and schools.

Mental health counselors often work with a larger team to create treatment plans for their patients. They work with primary care clinicians or psychiatrists to provide integrated care. Sometimes, they refer their patients to social services or other health care providers. Integrated care is especially helpful when patients need medical care, medications, and psychotherapies to treat their condition.

Overview

Peer recovery support specialists (PRSS) are individuals with lived experience in recovery from substance use or a mental health disorder. PRSS use their personal experience and education to provide support to individuals working through their own recovery. This peer-to-peer connection creates a sense of trust that is challenging to establish with someone who has not gone through similar experiences.

PRSS support their clients by using personal experience, empathy, cultural competence, and a focus on the individual's strengths to build resilience and encourage recovery. PRSS work in a variety of clinical and nonclinical settings, and focus on providing recovery support services to clients on their pathway to recovery. Many PRSS receive endorsements to work with specialized groups, like problem gambling or trauma-informed care.

PRSS also reduce public and self-stigma associated with mental and behavioral health, by acting as advocates for policy and systematic changes in the behavioral health field. They also educate the general population on recovery principles. Working as a peer recovery support specialist can lead to further career advancement in behavioral health care.

A growing number of organizations – such as CASAT at the University of Nevada, Reno and Foundation for Recovery in Las Vegas – provide coursework and training leading to certification in peer support.

Overview

Psychiatric technicians assist in the care and treatment of patients who are mentally ill or have developmental disabilities. They are essential to caring for their patients' well-being because they work directly with patients. Psychiatric technicians and aides help their patients with everyday tasks like eating and hygiene. They provide nursing, psychiatric, and personal care following physician instructions and hospital procedures.

Psychiatric technicians usually work in psychiatric hospitals and residential mental health facilities. They work as part of a larger mental health team consisting of psychiatrists, psychologists, nurses, and social workers. Since technicians interact with patients daily, they provide input for care plans based on their knowledge of their patients' behavior and activities.

Psychiatric technicians assist new patients and their families with admission when new patients arrive. They tteach patients basic skills in living, working, and social skills. They also encourage patients to participate in recreational activities. Some act as leaders in group counseling sessions.

Many health professionals begin their career as a psychiatric technician and advance to other professions in social work or psychology. Many employers train psychiatric technicians on the job and only require a high school diploma to start.

Overview

Psychiatrists are medical doctors who focus on diagnosing and treating people with mental illnesses and disorders. Psychiatrists attend medical school and have specialized training on how biology affects mental illness. Additionally, they prescribe medications to help their patients.

Psychiatrists examine and diagnose a patient's health and mental state. They develop treatment plans that combine talk and drug therapy. In some cases, psychiatrists admit patients to hospitals or refer them to other specialists for additional care.

Psychiatrists meet with patients to make sure their medication is working correctly. They also talk with family members about the patient's condition. Some psychiatrists conduct research and write articles for journals. Many psychiatrists teach or supervise students.

Some psychiatrists specialize in treating patients of specific age groups. Child and adolescent psychiatrists work with children, teenagers, and with the patient's families. They may use play therapy to help children. Geriatric psychiatrists specialize in working with the elderly. Industrial psychiatrists study behavior in the workplace and often use their knowledge to help businesses. Forensic psychiatrists advise the courts and assist individuals with mental illness navigate the criminal justice system.

Overview

Psychologists treat people with mental and emotional problems. They have professional training and clinical skills to help individuals manage mental health challenges, cope with stress, and improve overall well-being. Psychologists specialize in various areas of practice, some of which are described below.

Clinical psychologists assess, diagnose, and treat people with mental health conditions and challenging life circumstances. They use evidence-based treatments that focus on changing behavior and improving functioning. There are three major areas of psychology: counseling psychology, behavioral psychology, and school psychology. Other areas of psychology include research and industrial-organizational psychologists.

Counseling psychologists provide their patients with clinical or counseling services to help them solve problems and promote change. Counseling psychologists generally work with patients who have episodic issues, including people who are having difficulty adjusting to a significant life change. Counseling psychologists also work with people who have more complex, ongoing struggles and conflicts. These psychologists use evidence-based therapies to help their patients, including psychotherapy and hypnosis.

Behavioral psychologists observe how people react and behave in different situations. They help their patients understand why some behaviors are triggered and reinforced and then work to change how their patients respond so they can act in a way that will benefit them instead. These psychologists usually work with people who have complex issues, such as phobias. Some work with specific groups, such as children, adolescents, people with autism, or the elderly.

School psychologists work in K-12 school systems. They have specialized training in education and psychology, and require an endorsement from the Nevada State Department of Education. School psychologists collaborate with teachers, school staff, families, and other professionals to support students. They help find ways for students to succeed in life and school by evaluating students for learning disabilities and mental or behavioral challenges, and then creating and implementing education plans to modify how students are taught and engage emotionally and socially.

Overview

Social work is a broad and diverse field. Social workers support their patients by helping them solve complicated issues. Their work positively impacts individuals, families, and communities. Social workers ensure patients have all the necessary resources to achieve their goals by helping navigate programs and support systems. All social workers support their patients by advocating and developing plans to address challenges that are difficult to overcome independently.

The scope of work varies on their level of education, workplace environment, and the individual they assist. Three major areas of social work include child and family welfare, medical and public health social work, and clinical social work. School social workers help children at school by working with families and school administrators. Overview

Dental assistants work closely with dentists and dental hygienists to prepare for appointments, make patients comfortable, and assist with examining and treating patients. They obtain dental records for the dentist and prepare patients for their exam. They also sterilize instruments and equipment and prepare tray setups. After a patient's appointment, dental assistants record exam and treatment information in patients' charts.

During procedures, dental assistants pass and receive instruments and prepare materials for the dentist when requested. They use suction devices to keep the patients' mouths dry and clear. When patients have surgery, dental assistants instruct them in postoperative care. They also teach patients about general oral health care. Some dental assistants have other duties that require more training. They take x-rays of patient's teeth and process the film. They also remove stitches, apply numbing agents to the patient's gums, and apply fluoride to teeth to prevent cavities.

Dental assistants, who have lab duties, pour up casts of the teeth and mouth from impressions taken by dentists. They may also polish removable appliances, such as removable partials, and make temporary crowns. Dental assistants with office duties schedule and confirm patient appointments. They keep records, send bills, and take payments. They also order dental supplies and materials.

Increasingly, dental offices are offering paid apprenticeships for students training to become dental assistants. May positions only need a high school diploma to start working. As they receive additional education and training, they can take on more technical work, or become a dental hygienist or a dental laboratory technician.

Overview

Dental hygienist clean teeth and teach patients how to prevent tooth decay and gum disease. Dental hygienists also go into communities to teach about dental health, some specialize in teaching school children.

During routine examinations, dental hygienists inspect the patient's teeth for deposits and decay, and look for any shrinkage or disease in the gums. They look to see if the gums and lymph nodes under the chin show any swelling or other signs of cancer. Hygienists take x-rays of patients' teeth and take great care to position the camera at different angles around the head and mouth. They also develop film for dentists to use as they diagnose problems and design treatment plans.

Dental hygienists use dental instruments to clean plaque and various stains from teeth. Some hygienists are licensed to administer local anesthesia for patients who need specialized care during cleanings. Preparation may include applying numbing agents to a patient's gums to reduce discomfort for the patient.

Dental hygienists perform finishing work on certain procedures so the dentist can assist other patients. Examples include cleanings, scaling, fluoride applications, and sealants. They review patient medical histories and record notes in the patient file during the appointment. They chart conditions of decay and disease so that the dentist can diagnose and determine a treatment plan.

Overview

Dental laboratory technicians create devices to correct, replace, or restore the patient's teeth as prescribed by dentists. Their work is creative, hands-on, and quickly changes with new technological advances. They focus on creating pieces that look natural, while also being functional.

Dental laboratory technicians make and repair dentures, crowns, implants, and bridges. They create models based on specific measurements from each patient to create customized models and casts. Technicians construct crowns for patients from different materials. Technicians create bridges, which attach one or more false teeth to the patient's real teeth. In addition to creating the false tooth or teeth, technicians create the bands that attach them together.

Dental laboratory technicians repair damaged devices by filling chipped or low spots, rebuilding linings, fixing wire sections, and replacing missing teeth in dentures. Dental laboratory technicians may perform all stages of the work or specialize in one area.

Many dental offices offer paid apprenticeships for students training to become dental laboratory technicians.

Overview

Dentists examine patients' teeth and mouth, diagnose diseases or abnormalities, and plan appropriate treatments. Most dentists are general practitioners. They examine teeth, gums, and related tissues, using dental instruments, x-rays, or other diagnostic equipment. They advise or instruct patients regarding preventive dental care, the causes and treatment of dental problems, and offer oral health care services.

Dentists most often apply sealants, repair fractured teeth, and fill cavities. They oversee the modeling process to replace missing or pulled teeth and apply crowns to strengthen teeth. They perform surgery on gums and the bones that support the gums, including dental implants. Depending on the procedure, they give patients anesthetics to block the pain. Dentists use instruments such as drills, mirrors, and scalpels. Once the procedure is complete, dentists write prescriptions for drugs that reduce pain or the risk of infection. They also instruct patients on proper brushing, flossing, and use of fluorides.

Dentists often hire dental hygienists to handle routine preventive care, such as teeth cleanings. This allows the dentist to focus on more difficult dental procedures. Dentists also hire and supervise other employees, such as office staff, receptionists, and dental assistants.

Overview

Pharmacists dispense drugs prescribed by physicians and other health practitioners, and counsel patients on how to properly use prescribed drugs. Pharmacists advise medical staff and physicians about drug therapies. They also plan and monitor drug schedules for patients to ensure medications work together. They spend time working closely with patients to discuss their medication use for the best results.

Pharmacists primarily work in pharmacies, clinics, and hospitals. They provide information, give patient consultation, and explain appropriate use of prescription and non-prescription drugs. Pharmacists ask customers about their symptoms and current medications. Pharmacists monitor a patient's drug use to make sure they do not take drugs that have harmful interactions.

Pharmacists keep records about patients and inventory drug supplies. They analyze records to look at trends in drug use or possible excessive use. They use dispensing procedures to meet legal requirements. They monitor the security of controlled substances and the disposal of hazardous waste.

Pharmacy aides typically perform many of the administrative and clerical duties in the pharmacy. Their responsibilities include greeting customers, answering the telephone, handling money, and stocking shelves. Pharmacy aides are supervised by a pharmacist or a pharmacy technician. Aides must refer any questions regarding prescriptions, health issues, or specific drug information to a supervising pharmacist.

Pharmacy aides deliver medication to treatment areas, such as a hospital. Pharmacy aides oftentimes provide customer service and conduct sales. Overview

Pharmacy technicians help pharmacists provide medications and other health care products to patients. They review prescriptions or requests for refills that they receive from patients. Pharmacy technicians count, pour, measure, or mix the medication. They place the medication into a container, and prepare and attach a label. They price and fill the prescription, which must be checked by a pharmacist before it is given to a patient.

Pharmacy technicians may set up and maintain patient profiles which contain a patient's medication history. Technicians also fill out insurance claim forms. They take inventory of prescription and over- the-counter drugs so supplies can be ordered. They also stock incoming supplies, clean and maintain pharmacy equipment, and ring up sales on the cash register.

In hospitals, pharmacy technicians have more responsibilities. They read patient charts before preparing and delivering the medicine to patients. Technicians assemble a 24-hour supply of medications for patients with dosages packaged and labeled separately. In all cases, the pharmacy technician must have approval from the pharmacist prior to providing medicine to the patient.

Some pharmacy technicians with additional education and training can advance to other occupations, such as a pharmacist.

Trainers ensure athletes are in good shape and ready to compete. They teach athletes correct exercise techniques and stretching routines. Trainers often lead entire teams through stretching exercises before each game and practice.

Athletic trainers also inspect the playing fields for hazards that could harm players. They suggest diets and exercises to enhance an athlete's strength and endurance. Moreover, they organize physical examinations for players. Athletic trainers assist coaches in selecting equipment to prevent injuries. They also provide guidelines to athletes on properly using safety equipment and self-awareness to prevent injury.

Athletic trainers monitor injuries, big or small, to ensure they don't affect an athlete's performance or health. To safeguard against injuries, they apply taping, wrapping, or bracing before games and practices. After workouts, athletic trainers administer massages to alleviate soreness and strains. In the event of an injury, athletic trainers assess its severity, provide immediate first aid, and accompany the athlete to the hospital. Athletic trainers collaborate with doctors and physical therapists to establish a rehabilitation routine and determine when it's safe for the player to return to play.

Some athletic trainers work for health clubs or nonsports organizations. Others work with athletes on high school, college, and professional sports teams. Some individual athletes employ athletic trainers.

Overview

Audiologists assist individuals of all ages with hearing, balance, and ear-related issues. Often, hearing is affected by factors such as birth trauma, viral infections, genetic disorders, exposure to loud noise, certain medications, or aging. Audiologists use different tests to diagnose the cause of hearing loss and balance disorders. They then work to help their patients improve, manage, and prevent further damage.

Audiologists use various testing equipment to measure patients' hearing ability. In addition, they use computers to evaluate and diagnose balance disorders. Audiologists establish a diagnosis and personalized treatment plan by analyzing patient's testing data and other medical information. Audiologists recommend hearing aids or similar devices and help them get comfortable using them. Audiologists work with doctors to determine if surgery is needed. They monitor and modify treatment plans as necessary.

When advising employers on preventing hearing loss on the job, audiologists test work areas, point out sounds that can cause hearing loss, and recommend ways to protect workers. Audiologists also research new treatments, write reports, and present their findings. Others advise teaching and medical staff about preventing and treating hearing loss and balance disorders.

GENETIC COUNSELOR



Overview

Genetic counselors help people answer questions about their genes and inherited conditions. They evaluate a patient's family history, medical records, tests, and assess the results. Typically, genetic counselors confirm if a patient's condition or diagnosis is genetically based. Genetic counselors typically work with a physician to develop and confirm a diagnosis.

Genetic counselors meet with patients and their families. Counselors evaluate tests and provide information to patients. They explain test results to help patients make informed decisions. They provide examples of similar cases, explain possible outcomes, and discuss potential treatments.

Genetic counselors address any emotional issues uncovered by the results of the genetic tests. They also refer patients and families to community or state supported services such as support groups, specialists, or other counselors if necessary. In the past, genetic counselors generally worked with people who wanted to have children or were already pregnant and suspected there might be genetic problems. With the increased availability of DNA (deoxyribonucleic acid) tests, counselors now assist many more individuals with personal questions. Many patients seek information about specific genetic disorders, especially if they have a family history of heart disease or cancer.

This career is expanding as there are ongoing advancements in genetics. Most genetic counselors work in a medical setting as part of a healthcare team with doctors, social workers, nurses, medical geneticists, or other medical specialists. However, there is an increasing need for genetic counselors in different fields, such as research, diagnostic laboratories, the pharmaceutical industry, public health and education, and health consulting.

Overview

Massage therapists perform therapeutic manipulation of soft tissues and joints. This provides relaxation and improves overall health and well-being. Massage therapy is often described as both a science and an art. Therapists use knowledge about the body's anatomy to guide the use of different massage techniques. Many studies show that massage has several benefits including lowering blood pressure, reducing pain, and helping to improve recovery times. Medical massage therapists have advanced training and experience to improve patients' recovery.

Massage therapists apply oils, powders, or lotions to the skin before massaging the body. Some use hydrotherapy (water, ice, or steam) as part of the massage. They may also use herbal wraps and oil compresses. There are several different types of massage like Swedish, Shiatsu, deep tissue, and trigger point. Most massage therapists blend techniques and styles.

Common massage styles used in medicine include acupressure, lymph node drainage, sports massage, and reflexology. On-site massage, polarity, hot-stone, and muscle energy are also popular techniques. It is common for massage therapists to specialize in one or more techniques.

Massage therapists interview clients and take brief medical histories to tailor each treatment. Most work in spas and private offices, while some travel to clients' homes. Many are independent contractors with flexible work schedules. Massage therapists may consult with other health care professionals to develop treatment plans and help people manage injuries, stress, and chronic pain.

Overview

Occupational therapists (OTs) help people improve, develop, recover, or maintain their ability to perform tasks in living and working environments. The therapist helps clients to improve their basic motor functions, reasoning abilities, and compensate for permanent loss of function. They work closely with people who have mental, physical, developmental, or emotionally disabling conditions. These disabilities are caused by birth defects, injuries, illnesses, or aging.

In all cases, OTs meet with patients and evaluate their current skills and abilities. Therapists set rehabilitation goals that are realistic for each patient. They work with other professionals on the patient's rehabilitation team. The goal is to help clients lead independent, productive, and satisfying lives.

Occupational therapists engage their patients in many different activities designed to improve and adapt physical strength, coordination, low vision, memory, and reasoning. Items such as puzzles, scissors, or computer software are used while working with patients.

They teach some patients to use wheelchairs and other physical aids. They also design or make special equipment that patients need at work or home. They recommend changes to physical surroundings so it is adapted to meet their patient's needs. Some occupational therapists help patients find and keep jobs. They arrange jobs, plan work activities, and follow patient progress through an evaluation process.

Occupational therapists may specialize in working with patients of a certain age or specific disability. In addition, occupational therapists often lead programs in hospitals, community settings, and other institutions. These programs are often designed to promote health and awareness about disabilities.

Overview

Occupational therapist assistants (OTAs) work under the supervision of occupational therapists. They work with people who have mental, physical, or developmental disabilities. They aim to help patients live more independently by teaching and developing life skills.

Occupational therapist assistants follow treatment plans designed by occupational therapists and help patients with the prescribed activities and exercises. Activities include self-care and work-related skills. Assistants teach patients and their families about basic living skills at home.

Occupational therapist assistants instruct patients about the care and use of special equipment. Overview

Orthotists design, build, and fit braces, supports, and corrective shoes called orthoses. Prosthetists design, build, and fit replacement limbs like arms, legs, hands, or feet. These appliances are called prostheses. Both use creative skills and craftsmanship to create, repair, and maintain appliances. They work on and design devices prescribed by physicians and veterinarians.

Orthotists and prosthetists often work with other medical professionals to develop the appliance and treatment plan. They examine patients and take measurements of the affected parts of the body. They sometimes make plaster casts directly from the patient's body to be sure the devices fit comfortably. They use measurements to create models and layouts to design and draw replacement limbs, corrective shoes, inserts, braces, or surgical supports.

Orthotists and prosthetists send their designs to assistants or technicians to build the product. They select the materials and component parts, such as wood, plastic, fabric, padding, and metal. Then, they form, saw, mold, shape, grind, polish, buff, sew components together, and join parts using screws, rivets, glue, and heat. When devices are ready, orthotists and prosthetists work with patients to fit, test, and evaluate them. They make sure that devices fit correctly and that all parts are working as designed. Orthotists and prosthetists show patients how to use their appliances.

Orthotists and prosthetists research new designs, materials, and technologies. They discuss designs with patients and coworkers. They teach student doctors, assistants, technicians, and rehabilitation counselors about orthoses and prostheses. Orthotists and prosthetists attend conferences and seminars to update their skills. Many write and publish their findings from their work.

Overview

Physical therapists (PTs) diagnose and treat individuals of all ages with medical problems that limit their abilities to move and perform functional activities. Doctors refer patients to a physical therapist for conditions such as low back pain and arthritis. They also work with patients recovering from surgery, accidents, strokes, and heart disease.

Physical therapists help patients manage pain, and improve strength and mobility. They must evaluate the patient's posture, balance, strength, muscle function, and range of motion. After evaluating their patient, PTs write a treatment plan. Physical therapists often have assistants and aides to help to carry out the treatment plan.

Physical therapists use a wide range of treatments. They make sure patients understand how the treatments work and answer questions. The physical therapists facilitate the patients' movement by building an exercise plan to improve flexibility and increase strength. In their practice, PTs use hot and cold packs, ultrasound, electrical stimulation, deep tissue massage, and traction devices. They may refer patients for prosthetic devices, which are artificial replacements for legs or arms.

Physical therapists teach patients to do exercises at home and to use assistive devices. PTs monitor their patients' progress and modify plans when necessary. They consult with other medical staff about patients' responses to treatment. They lead group activities and teach physical therapy students. Some physical therapists also conduct research and educate the community on injury prevention and treatment.

Physical therapist assistants (PTAs) carry out treatment plans set by a physical therapist. They work with patients who have low back pain, arthritis, heart disease, broken bones, or accidental injuries. PTAs are supervised by a physical therapist to assist patients with their assigned therapies.

Physical therapist assistants review the treatment plan with the physical therapist for each patient. They teach patients exercises that strengthen muscles or improve mobility. Overview

Respiratory therapists (RTs) evaluate, treat, and care for patients with breathing or other cardiopulmonary disorders. Practicing under the direction of a physician, RTs assume primary responsibility for all respiratory care, treatments, diagnostic procedures, and the supervision of respiratory therapy technicians. They consult with physicians and health care staff to develop and modify patient care plans. RTs also provide complex therapy to patients in critical conditions, including those on life support in intensive care units of hospitals.

Respiratory therapists work in hospitals, sleep centers, surgical settings, and urgent care. They often assist patients who have complex breathing issues. They test a patient's lung capacity, and measure oxygen and acidity levels in a patient's blood. They monitor their conditions and consult with the physician if a patient has any adverse reactions to treatment. They inform patients about procedures and help them feel comfortable in all situations.

To treat patients, respiratory therapists use many devices and life support systems, such as ventilators. Respiratory therapists teach patients how to use and check their equipment, like oxygen tanks, for home use. Therapists administer breathable medicines called inhalants. Therapists teach patients how to inhale so the drug is most effective.

Respiratory therapists track the equipment used by patients, to make sure that safety precautions are followed. Respiratory therapists sometimes perform tasks outside their typical role, including performing procedures that test heart and lung function, such as stress tests.

Overview

Speech-language pathologists, sometimes called speech therapists, assess and treat persons with speech, language, voice, and fluency disorders. Speech-language pathologists work with people who have difficulty producing speech sounds, such as individuals with a lisp or stutter. They also help patients who wish to improve their communication skills by modifying an accent. Other patient cases include those with cognitive communication impairments, such as attention, memory, and problemsolving disorders.

During the initial consultation, speech-language pathologists evaluate the client's ability to communicate and understand language by testing their hearing, cognitive skills, mouth structure, and muscles. They also work with people who have difficulty swallowing.

Speech-language pathologists consult with other professionals to interpret test results and design plans specific to the client's needs. For example, they teach clients how to make specific sounds. They may also teach sign language or lip reading. Some speech pathologists research new treatments and write reports about their findings. Others advise teaching and medical staff about preventing and treating hearing loss and speech disorders.

Overview

Medical equipment preparers prevent the spread of germs and bacteria in medical facilities by sterilizing, cleaning and maintaining laboratory and healthcare equipment. They clean and sterilize equipment and instruments by using various methods, like steam autoclaves and washes. They maintain a variety of items including dialysis machines, surgical tools, hospital beds, and respirators.

Medical equipment preparers keep commonly used supplies and instruments ready as needed for staff. They also prepare requests for special equipment. Overview

Medical laboratory technicians perform routine laboratory tests for the diagnosis, treatment, and prevention of disease under the supervision of a medical laboratory technologist or laboratory supervisor. They run tests using samples of body fluids, cells, or tissues. Examples of testing include looking for bacteria, parasites, and other microorganisms; analyzing the chemical content of fluids; matching blood for transfusions; and testing for drug levels in the blood to monitor patient treatment.

Medical laboratory technologists perform complex laboratory tests that are used to detect, diagnoses and treat patients. On any given day, duties may range from confirming a case of diabetes to detecting a case of leukemia.

Medical laboratory technologists use samples of body fluids, cells, and tissues to identify abnormal blood cells, toxic agents, and cancerous tumors. Blood tests are used most often to determine specific information about patient health including morphology, blood type, or compatibility with treatments. Phlebotomists collect, transport, handle, and process blood specimens for analysis, donation, and other medical purposes. Phlebotomists use medical equipment and supplies, such as tourniquets, needles, and swabs to collect blood samples.

Due to the risk of blood-borne pathogens, phlebotomists take many precautions to prevent the transmission of disease. Overview

Cardiovascular technicians and technologists, use different tests to evaluate pulmonary (lung) and cardiac (heart and blood vessel) systems in patients. They use specialized electronic test equipment, recording devices, and laboratory instruments for diagnostic, therapeutic, or research purposes. They commonly use electrocardiograms (EKGs), stress testing, and echocardiograms to assess individuals. Cardiovascular technologists have additional education and training to perform more complicated tasks assisting physicians.

Cardiovascular technicians who conduct EKG tests are called electrocardiograph technicians and often assist cardiovascular technologists. An EKG machine traces the rhythm of the heart. They also perform stress tests, often using treadmills, and fit patients with portable heart monitors to provide data to physicians.

Cardiovascular technologists monitor a patient's heart and help physicians diagnose cardiovascular disease. They also assist with cardiac catheterization requiring the insertion of small tubes, called catheters, into a patient's body. During these tests, cardiovascular technologists monitor patients' blood pressure and watch the heart's activity. They also monitor patients during open heart surgery and other heart procedures. Some specialize in using ultrasound on the heart and are called echocardiographers.

Many health professionals begin their career as a cardiovascular technician and often advance to other professions in medical imaging, including cardiovascular technologist.

Diagnostic medical sonographers use ultrasound equipment to examine different organs and tissues throughout a patient's body. Ultrasounds are used for a variety of medical reasons including abdominal sonography, breast sonography, cardiac sonography, and seeing a baby in the womb. Since ultrasounds and sonography use sound waves to produce images, the equipment can be used to safely look at tissues and organs throughout the body.

Diagnostic medical sonographers use a specialized instrument called a transductor to scan a patient's body. The transductor can come in different shapes and sizes to scan different parts of the body. Sonographers use ultrasound to examine, assess, and help diagnose patients. They are trained to differentiate between healthy and unhealthy tissues and organs. Their findings are confirmed by a physician to make the final diagnosis.

Overview

Nuclear medicine technologists prepare, measure, and administer radioactive drugs to patients for imaging or treatment. They work directly with physicians and radiation therapists to calculate how much radiation or radioactive medications the treatment will require. They prepare the proper dosage and give it to the patient by mouth, injection, or other means.

Nuclear medicine technologists use high-level imaging equipment and cameras to detect the radioactive medications as they move through the body. They carefully prepare the proper dosage of drugs and calibrate equipment so patients don't receive too much radiation and monitor the patient for any adverse reactions. They use similar procedures to treat cancers or tumors without surgery.

Nuclear medicine technologists perform studies to assess how radioactive materials act inside the body. They also run tests on cardiac function and develop procedures for treatment programs. They follow established safety procedures to order, dispose of, and store radioactive materials. Some train and supervise other technologists and those studying in nuclear medicine programs.

Before giving treatments, radiation therapists explain procedures to patients, answer their questions, and provide emotional support. Radiation therapists position patients ensure the treatment receive treatment in the right place. Radiologic technologists use special equipment to take images of internal organs, tissues, and bones. They use X-rays, fluoroscopy, and computerized tomography (CT) to scan and image their patients. They take single pictures, like an X-ray to see bones, or real-time moving images with fluoroscopy. They create images under the general direction of physicians. Some have specialized training to operate magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) that produce more detailed images.

Overview

Registered dietitian nutritionists (RDNs) are experts in using food and nutrition to improve and maintain health. They plan and conduct food service or nutritional programs to assist in the promotion of health and control of disease. There are four main areas of work for dietitians: management, clinical, community, and consultant.

Management dietitians are in charge of meal planning on a large scale. They generally work in large hospitals, schools, prisons, and cafeterias. They supervise workers who plan, prepare, and serve meals.

Clinical dietitians work in hospitals, nursing homes, and physicians' offices. They are in charge of developing meal plans that provide the correct nutrients for patients and provide medical nutrition therapy, such as low-cholesterol and low-fat meals. They monitor patients to see if they improve with dietary changes.

Community dietitians work with the public and individuals. These dietitians design and teach classes about diet and nutrition. They plan, organize, and prepare materials for the classes. Similar to clinical dietitians, community dietitians evaluate patients and design their diets. Other community dietitians develop large-scale interventions that benefit entire populations. Most community dietitians work in public health settings. Others work with schools, home health agencies, health maintenance organizations (HMOs), food banks, and grocery stores.

Consultant dietitians often run their own business. They analyze their client's health and offer diet advice to those interested in changing their current dietary habits. Consultant dietitians work with businesses in the food industry to give advice about nutrition for their products.

In addition, medical administrative assistants record patients' simple medical history, health insurance information, and other related forms. They arrange for patients to be hospitalized or refer patients to labs or to other health care providers.

Medical administrative assistants are trained in information coding, insurance theory, computerized billing, office communications, and patient interactions. They need to be highly organized, efficient, and have strong interpersonal skills. Many health professionals begin their career as a medical administrative assistant.

Overview

Medical billers and coders process medical insurance billing and claims in healthcare settings by using specialized coding. Every time a patient receives professional health care, the medical biller and coder review doctors' and nurses' notes from medical records that explain the treatments given to patients. They then assign codes to each treatment, service, and medication. These codes are based on International Classification of Diseases (ICD) codes and Current Procedure Terminology (CPT) codes. They put all of the codes together to create an insurance claim to ensure that health care providers are paid for their services.

Medical billers and coders are responsible for accurately coding claims and are trained to understand insurance plans and regulations, ICD and CPT codes, and guidelines. They make sure that all insurance forms are completed accurately. Additionally, medical billers and coders are responsible for preparing billing invoices. They also collect payments, interpret benefits, handle denied claims, and process appeals.

Medical billers and coders work in every type of health care facility, including doctor's offices, surgery centers, and hospitals. Some billers and coders work from home as independent contractors and bill for their services on an hourly basis.

Overview

Medical interpreters and translators convert information from one language to another. Interpreters work in spoken or sign language, and translators work in written language. Medical interpreters and translators typically work in health care settings and help patients communicate with doctors, nurses, and other medical staff. Both interpreters and translators have a strong grasp of medical terminology and the common words for those medical terms in both languages. While interpreting and translating they maintain message content, context, and style as much as possible.

Medical interpreters work with live speech. They listen to speakers and translate what they say. Medical interpreters may interpret consecutively, which means they wait for the speaker to pause. They may also interpret simultaneously, which means they translate while the speaker talks. Medical interpreters must be sensitive to patient's personal situations with health care providers. Interpreters work in a variety of healthcare settings, including hospitals, clinics, private offices, rehabilitation centers and nursing homes. They confront unique issues related to working in mental health facilities, substance abuse clinics, forensic services, and domestic violence programs.

Health or medical translators only work with written text. They primarily convert written information from one language to another instead of working directly with patients. They often convert information on brochures, forms, and website information. Translators access resources, like dictionaries, when making translations to ensure that the translated documents are accurate. Many specialize in one language and work as independent contractors.

Medical records specialists maintain electronic patient medical records for hospitals and clinics. Medical records specialists make sure records are complete and accurate, as well as secure and confidential. They conduct their work in a manner consistent with medical, administrative, ethical, legal, and regulatory requirements of the health care system. Records include patient symptoms, diagnoses, medical history, treatment plans, and test results.

Medical records specialists enter patients' information into digital systems. Then, specialists work with medical billers and coders to assign a code to each diagnosis and procedure using International Classification of Diseases (ICD) codes and Current Procedure Terminology (CPT) codes. The ICD and CPT is used in billing and determines the structure of payment from insurance companies to health care providers.

Some medical records specialists maintain special systems, called registries. These systems are for specific groups of patients, such as those who have cancer, heart disease, or organ transplants. They perform other related duties such as transcription, processing insurance bills, and handling patient admission and discharge forms.

Ophthalmic laboratory technicians prepare optical prescriptions by choosing the correct plastic or glass blank lens. They use specialized equipment and machines to measure, cut, and grind each lens. Each lens is carefully inspected to ensure that it was cut according to the prescription and is free from imperfections. Finally, technicians apply finishes, add attachments like nose pads, and mount the lenses into frames.

Ophthalmic laboratory technicians work with clients to fit frames, make repairs, or adjust eyeglasses as requested. In some cases, they make lenses for microscopes, telescopes, and other optical equipment. Many employers train ophthalmic laboratory technicians on the job and only require a high school diploma to start.

Overview

Opticians, sometimes called ophthalmic dispensers, fit contact lenses and eyeglasses according to prescriptions and patients' needs. They take measurements of a client's eyes and nose bridge, and recommend eyeglass frames, lenses, and lens coatings that complement their face shape and lifestyle.

Opticians prepare work orders and instructions for making lenses and eyeglasses. If the client has insurance, they often submit insurance forms for payment. Opticians spend time teaching clients how to properly wear, clean, and store their glasses and contact lenses.

Opticians often have sales and administrative duties. In addition to helping client's choose frames and contact lenses, they help them select sunglasses, eyeglass cases, and cleaning solutions. They arrange displays of frames and other merchandise. Opticians keep records of work orders, insurance payments, and inventory. Opticians verify the accuracy of the lens prescription after they are prepared. There are many licensed apprenticeships for students training to become opticians.

Overview

Optometrists diagnose, manage, and treat conditions and diseases of the eye and visual system. During examinations, they diagnose problems or impairments, prescribe corrective lenses, and provide treatment and medications. Some optometrists specialize in one area, such as vision therapy, or with one type of patient, like children or the elderly.

Optometrists use various equipment, eye drops, and observation to determine the health of the patient's eyes. During examinations, they look for diseases and abnormalities, such as glaucoma. They test their patient's vision by having them identify items at a distance. For patients who have vision problems, optometrists use special equipment to determine the prescription for corrective lenses.

Optometrists test the patient's color perception and ability to focus and coordinate their eyes. They analyze test results, create a treatment plan, and discuss any findings and plans with patients. Optometrists teach about proper lighting, care of glasses and contact lenses, and general eye safety and health. Optometrists consult with, and refer patients to, other health professionals if additional treatment is needed.

Overview

Veterinarians are also called doctors of veterinary medicine. They diagnose, study, treat, and control animal injuries and diseases. Most veterinarians work with small animals and pets, including dogs, cats, ferrets, and lizards. Others work with large animals and livestock, like pigs, goats, horses, and cows. Some veterinarians choose to specialize in a particular type of treatment, such as dentistry, surgery, pathology, microbiology, or internal medicine.

Veterinarians examine animals and consult with owners about care. To maintain animals' health, veterinarians provide annual exams and administer vaccines to protect them against diseases such as rabies. They explain lab test results and review treatment options with owners when animals are sick or have ongoing conditions.

Veterinarians operate on animals and treat injuries such as wounds and broken bones. Occasionally, veterinarians euthanize animals that are seriously ill or injured. They also examine dead animals to determine the cause of death. Some veterinarians participate in research projects aimed to prevent diseases in both humans and animals. Others work in wildlife management, zoos, aquariums, and labs. It is common for veterinarians to teach at universities and colleges.

Overview

Veterinary assistants support licensed veterinarians and veterinary technicians in their daily tasks. Veterinary assistants care for animals and assist veterinarians with lab tests, treatment, and surgery. Most work in clinics and research labs. They feed, water, and exercise animals. They clean cages and are responsible for sterilizing all exam areas. They also keep a close watch on animals in treatment or after surgery, and notify the veterinarian of any changes or problems.

Depending on where they work, veterinary assistants have additional responsibilities. They assist with administering shots, dressing wounds, and stabilizing injuries. Veterinary assistants collect and prepare specimens, like blood or urine, and run some simple lab tests. Assistants prepare medications and sterilize instruments for surgery. They also prepare the animal and assist the veterinarian during surgery.

Veterinary assistant's work can vary by location and the animals they treat. For example, some work with pets and others work with farm animals. Many professionals begin their career as a veterinary assistant. Many employers train veterinary assistants on the job and only require a high school diploma to start.

Overview

Veterinary technicians perform various animal health care duties under the supervision of licensed veterinarians. They are often described as an "extra set of hands" for veterinarians. They perform a number of services, but do not diagnose, prescribe, or perform surgery. Most veterinary technicians work in veterinary clinics, research labs, and emergency centers caring for animals.

Veterinary technicians perform medical tests to diagnose disease and treat animals. They draw blood, collect tissue samples, and do laboratory work. In addition, technicians take and develop x-rays, and help to perform dental procedures. They prepare and administer vaccines, treatments, and medications prescribed by a veterinarian. Veterinary technicians often teach animal owners about medications, illnesses, and the general care of their pets.

Veterinary technicians prepare animals and instruments for surgery and assist veterinarians during operations. They administer anesthetics and monitor the animals during anesthesia and recovery. They also provide emergency first aid and assist with administering euthanasia.

Overview

Acupuncturists study traditional Chinese medicine, anatomy, and medical ethics. They treat patients by balancing energy that is believed to flow through people's bodies. Acupuncturists identify and select specific points on the body where they insert special needles to relieve pain and restore health.

Practitioners of Chinese medicine learn that the human body has specific points along a network of channels called meridians. A source of vital energy called "Qi" (pronounced "chi") flows through those channels and helps organs and other body systems to function.

Acupuncture is used to rebalance the flow of Qi in order to restore physical and mental health. In Western medicine, acupuncture is viewed as a way to stimulate nerves, muscles, and connective tissue to boost the body's natural painkillers.

Acupuncturists also use other aspects of Chinese medicine such as herbal medicine, meditative therapy, and shiatsu (a form of massage). They sometimes function as a primary care or general doctor.

Acupuncturists examine patients, ask about medical history, review treatment options, and make changes in treatment as needed.

Chiropractors assess, treat, and care for patients by manipulating the spine and musculoskeletal system. While chiropractors commonly help people manage back and neck pain, they also help people with a variety of ailments, including headaches.

Chiropractors believe that improper function of the spine causes chronic pain and other health-related problems. Their approach to health care is holistic and stress the patient's overall health. They use a variety of natural, drug-free, and non-surgical treatments.

Chiropractors use therapies such as massage, heat, or stretching. Such therapies relax the muscles and stimulate tissues so that healing can occur. Chiropractors provide counseling to patients about holistic health and wellness approaches, such as nutrition, exercise, and stress management. They also apply supports to body parts, such as straps or braces. Certain cases require that they consult with, and refer patients to, other health practitioners.
